

Scoping visit to Niger: Summary Points

## Background



N4D previously worked in Niger on PNIN in early 2023

 Discussions with HC3N/INS re-N4D support for stronger nutrition nexus in Niger

 2025, MoH invited N4D to assess feasibility of developing a nutrition nexus approach for Niger

#### Situation



- Many types of crisis; Drought, floods, insecurity/insurgency, economic downturn/inflation, population displacement – chronic in nature mainly
- Levels of malnutrition are high
- Stunting prevalence in CU5 improved between 2006-2012 (54%-42%) but increased again to 47% in 2022
- Wasting prevalence at 12.2% (2.4% severe) -> WHO emergency threshold.
- Anaemia affecting 70% of under fives

#### **Nutrition Programmes**



- PNSN (2017-2025) is framework for tacking malnutrition through multi-sector programming
- PNSN Action Plan monitored by PNIN
- PNSN had lower than expected domestic financing, weak sector and international partner reporting. No RM plan.
- Treatment of malnutrition programmes over-reliant on humanitarian financing with cost, supply chain and delivery challenges
- EU funded PCMIAS programme (2020-2029) goal 50% of treatment programmes covered by domestic resources by 2029
- Some agencies implementing longer-term nutrition programmes with malnutrition prevention focus

#### **Nutrition Financing**



- Incomplete data on domestic & international financing
- Increased from 0.9% to 3.1%. of GDP btw 2018 and 2022
- Pre-2023, Humanitarian financing declining
- Since 2023, proportion humanitarian financing increased now around 80-85% of ODA
- Some donors more development and resilience oriented
- To tackle drivers of malnutrition, need increase in development/resilience financing

## Towards a Nutrition Nexus Approach



#### Seize the momentum

- All stakeholders met see need to move to focus more on prevention of malnutrition and more sustainable treatment programmes
- PDES replaced by resilience for fatherland programme (PRSP)
- UK AID and SDC establishing regional resilience programmes
- OCHA new approach

## **Updating PNSN**



- Ends November 2025 = opportunity to integrate nexus approach
- Draw on MoHA/CTTNUD tools and sectors

- Ensure new national policies and plans are consolidated
- Develop investment case and RM plan-domestic & international
- Niger part of informal nexus advocacy working group with Afghanistan, Ethiopia and Yemen. Each strengthening nexus approach to nutrition = opportunity to exchange learning

## **Updating PNSN continued**



 Plans for end term evaluation of the PNSN stalled but stakeholders have identified weaknesses of current PNSN:

- > Inadequate data from sectors/ poor reporting by development partners
- ➤ Lack of monitoring of funding streams and coverage of activities
- > Not adequately embedded in sub-national development plans
- Action Plan didn't prioritise geographic locations and high impact activities
- The PNIN in INS best placed to provide hard data and analysis to inform a light touch evaluation.

## **Updating PNSN continued**



- Secure funding for evaluation urgently where from?
- Convene working group to develop ToR for evaluation
- Working Group to also lead/oversee writing team for new PNSN
- WG must include PNIN, sector focal points, TUN, SUN WG focal points, GTN and humanitarian cluster coordinators
- Develop new PNSN outline/contents concurrently
- Convene high level ministerial meetings focussed on advocacy for new PNSN and nutrition nexus approach (N4D talking to different heads of agencies).

## Nexus Principals in PNSN



- Align with the principles set out by CTTNUD
- ➤ Building nutrition resilience through multisector nutrition specific and sensitive activities targeted to at-risk populations in crisis vulnerable localities
- ➤ Coordination between humanitarian, development and peace actors to synergise efforts and ensure long-term nutrition resilience building
- ➤ Localise planning & responses to identify local problems & solutions, enable earlier response to shocks and build sustainable locally governed services
- ➤ Multi-year funding to enable predictable resources

M&E Indicators to be developed and used to monitor progress

### **Governance and Coordination**



 Dedicated PNSN working group with adequate resources to function and TA via short-term consultancies

 Arête to enable the Head of MoH/DN to convene nutrition focal points from relevant ministries and from SUN Networks

 Possibly locate updating of PNSN within the GTNN structure as sub-working group

#### PNSN areas for strengthening



- Dissemination to sub-national level and sensitisation of stakeholders
- Utilise experience of CTTNUD to inform integration into local government planning
- Monitoring Indicators based on those successfully collected in the past while those that could not be collected should be discarded or adapted.
- Non-government implementation partners must align and report to the monitoring framework. An arête could be issued to ensure compliance
- Include nexus specific indicators in the M&E framework to monitor progress of the approach,
- Resource mobilisation plan should be continuously updated through the M&E system to identify gaps and shortfalls.
- Ideally INS/PNIN will continue its monitoring role

#### Resource Mobilisation for PNSN



Current financing climate challenging

 Contribution needed from national treasury and sub-national (region, department and commune levels) government

- Alignment of donor resources with new PNSN Policy and Action Plan essential
- Need one donor approach with coordination around financing (SDN)

 Donors must participate in the process of identifying PNSN programme priorities to align accordingly

## N4D Support



#### **PNSN** evaluation

N4D can help develop ToR and participate in evaluation process and reporting

#### **Developing new PNSN and Action Plan**

N4D can support process for updating including ToR for the working/steering group, support technical consultants and input into PNSN drafts

Help define nutrition nexus-centric indicators for monitoring

Participate in sub-national visits to strengthen understanding of how to embed the PNSN Action Plan within local coordination mechanisms, e.g. CTROs, national level development plans

### N4D Support continued



#### **Capacity Building**

Support a national workshop on nutrition nexus approaches being implemented in Niger and the region to inform best practice for the PNSN

#### **Resource mobilisation**

Support development of a RM strategy drawing on Ethiopia& Yemen experience

#### Learning event between Afghanistan, Ethiopia, Yemen, Niger

Support a learning exchange on advancing MSNAPs through a nexus approach in late 2025/early 2026
